Leaders target improved readiness

AMCOM leaders zeroed in on achieving the next level of readiness during a quarterly report to higher headquarters.

Maj. Gen. Todd Royar, AMCOM commanding general, outlined a plan focusing on what it takes to achieve an 85% fully mission capable rate across the Army's aviation platforms. Several AMCOM experts explained how efforts across the organization will boost mission-capable rates and increase support to the warfighter.

"I know we can achieve this, and it will be incredibly powerful," said Army Materiel Command's Gen. Gus Perna. "Don't let naysayers stop us – don't be constrained. Your job is to keep helicopters and missiles... [READ MORE](#)

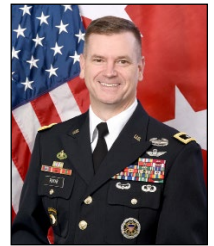

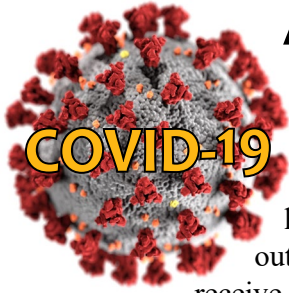


The catch phrase of the chapter is: "When the unbelievable happens, the unbelievable rise to meet it."

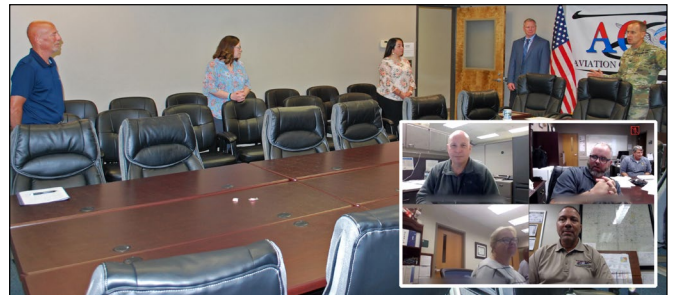

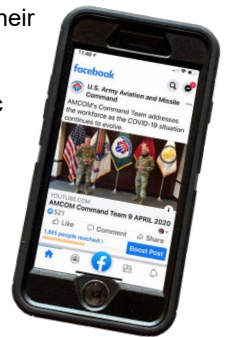

Privacy officials call for cautious telework practices



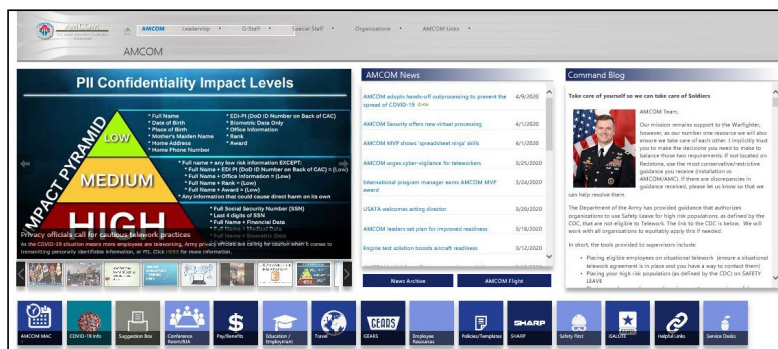
As the COVID-19 situation means more employees are teleworking, Army privacy officials are calling for caution when it comes to transmitting personally identifiable information, or PII.
