

Hotline team corrects data, improves safety

For nearly 40 years, Army aviation experts have manned a helpdesk dedicated to aircraft safety. Soldiers and maintainers know it as the "2410 hotline" – the place to turn for data corrections that mitigate risk and future errors.

AMCOM employees

from the Customer Support Branch for The Army Maintenance Management System-Aviation (TAMMS-A) answer hotline calls and emails regarding lifecycle items on Army aircraft, including the critical safety items that keep them flying. The term 2410 refers to the Department of Army form that records and reports aircraft maintenance data.

Automated data from various sources continually flows into AMCOM's systems – and sometimes that data is wrong.

The MAC is back

As a result of coordination, input and testing from representatives across the entire command, AMCOM released its updated Master Activities Calendar (MAC) online application, Feb. 10.

The updated MAC features additional capabilities and improved functionality to increase visibility of Key Leader, Battle Rhythm and other events across the command.

As a part of AMCOM's overall Knowledge

Management effort, the MAC is designed to provide the leadership and workforce a long-range strategic planning calendar tool which should complement synchronization efforts, de-conflict event scheduling and improve overall information sharing.

"Any time there's a human in the loop or fingers on a keyboard, there are going to be errors," said Alex Brock, chief of the TAMMS-A Customer Support Branch.

Support branch logisticians stay on the lookout for inaccuracies. The 20-member team continually scrubs data to identify errors – which resulted in more than 454,000 corrections last year. Local dignitaries, community members and senior military officials helped celebrate the Mine Resistance Ambush Protected RG-31 vehicle program on Jan. 24 at Letterkenny Army Depot in Pennsylvania.


Leaders recognized the workforce that pulsed at a rate of one-truckper-day to produce 828 vehicles of the newest configuration to serve the nation's warfighters.

Since World War II, the Army's organic industrial base has provided equipment to Soldiers in the field, improving upon and modifying equipment in support of national defense. Depot Commander Col.



Gregory Gibbons recalled entering the Middle East with unarmored vehicles which were ill equipped for the modern combat environment.

"We quickly realized we didn't have the right equipment – and you



should recognize what your role has been in providing the right equipment to support the greatest Army in the world," Gibbons told the workforce.
