AMCOM resource management team puts money back to work

Every year, AMCOM procures billions in parts and services needed to sustain and enable aviation, missile, and calibration materiel readiness for the U.S. Army. Sometimes, a contract or procurement action is delayed or otherwise not fulfilled in a timely manner and that ties up funds needed to support Soldiers across the Army. Occasionally, more money is allocated for a contract than the value of goods or services delivered or the delivered product does not meet the contract specifications or requirements.

To combat this issue, AMCOM’s Army Working Capital Fund Division embarked on a daunting task – clearing nearly 4,400 aged and dormant financial transactions. Some of those transactions have been lying dormant for over six years.

“As of May 2019, AMCOM had 4,432 transactions requiring detailed reconciliation,” said Heidi Lattuca, AMCOM’s AWCF division chief. “Over the last year, our accounting branch cleared almost 2,000 of these... [READ MORE](#)
