Colonel Rich Martin graduated from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in May 1995 and was commissioned as an aviation officer. Throughout his 25-year career, he has served in multiple command and staff positions at various levels, including multiple operational deployments in support of Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom.

In his current positions, Martin serves as the Chief of Staff, U.S. Army Aviation and Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.

Instructor for the Advanced Military Studies Program at the School of Advanced Military Studies, Fort

Division, Fort Riley, Kansas; Battalion Executive Officer of 4th Battalion, 227th Aviation Regiment, 1st
Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas; Brigade Executive Officer of the 21st Cavalry Brigade, Fort Hood, Texas;
and principal planner and writer for the Chief of Staff of the Army's Holistic Aviation Assessment Task Force.

His military education includes the Aviation Officer Basic Course, the Aviation Captain's Career Course, the Combined Arms Staff Services School, the Command and General Staff College/ Intermediate Level Education and the School of Advanced Military Studies Advance Military Studies Program, as well as the Army's Strategic Leadership Studies Program.
